

Three languages, three countries, three continents, a string of fractures; carefreeness, waiting and loneliness, the crash of bombings, moments of happiness, and then, at the age of 14, uprooting. David Daoud's childhood without adolescence is the breeding ground for a prolific body of work.

Born in Lebanon in 1970, David Daoud lives and works in the Vexin region of France. He is represented by galleries in several countries, including Paris, Honfleur and Colmar in France, as well as Beirut, New York, Abu Dhabi, Liège and Brescia. His works are part of several collections, including the permanent collection of the Institut du Monde Arabe in Paris and the Musée de la Préhistoire in Beirut. In 2018, Ibrahim Maalouf chose one of his paintings to illustrate the cover of his album Levantine Symphony .I.

Daoud began drawing as a child, then trained at the Ecole supérieure nationale des Arts décoratifs in Paris. He perfected his technique with his mentor, the famous sculptor Charles Auffret, himself a pupil of Auguste Rodin's disciples.

Timelessness is like harmony. Mysterious, inexplicable at first glance, it appeals to the origins of origins. Daoud draws, paints and sculpts with the energy, the life and the absolute contained in the primal cry of his own, driven by the silence of others.

He paints his exiles, sublimating his traumas, deciding to live wholeheartedly.

Drawing his inspiration from prehistoric cave art, the great masters of painting, pieces from the German Romantic repertoire and Handel's oratorios, Daoud is invested with a mission: to tell the story, in his own unique style.

A relentless worker, an unrivalled observer of nature and, indeed, of our humanity, Daoud rises to his feet and enters into a no-holds-barred battle with narrative, canvas and matter, with the necessity of the greatest. This necessity compels him to tell with everything and nothing, black ink, buckets of paint, pigments thrown in by the handful, filasse and binders, building a multi-faceted work, the fruit of constant questioning. And all telling one and the same story: his own.

It's the story we tell in this book, in an attempt to bring together the keys that enable the unconscious of the artist and his viewers to find an easier way to meet.
